	developed on the site of a Slav fishing village as the castle of a territorial overlord and a merchants' settlement. From the 15th century, it became the seat of Saxon dukes, elector princes and kings. By the 18th century, the city in the Elbe valley had become a resplendent centre of European culture, politics and business and was being called "Florence on the Elbe" on account of its art collections and Baroque architecture, but only two centuries later it became a universal symbol of apocalyptic destruction and the use of military force against a civilian population. Since 1945, alongside the reconstruction of the old city with the Church of Our Lady (Frauenkirche), the Semper Opera House, the Royal Palace and the Zwinger, an objective and critical culture of remembrance has developed. Dresden is rich in centuries-old cultural treasures from the realms of architecture, theatre and music. These include the Striezel Market, founded in 1434, which is one of Germany's oldest Christmas markets, as well as the Saxon State Orchestra (Sächsische Staatskapelle) and State Opera Company (Sächsische Staatsoper), which trace their origins to the foundation of the Hofkantorei, the choir of the electoral court, in 1548.

The Spanish royal court is gripped by an icy coldness: For reasons of politics, the heir to the throne, Don Carlo, has lost his bride Elisabetta to his father, the Spanish king. The crown prince is also thwarted in his political ambitions. The king, on the other hand, is powerless against the fiercely devout Grand Inquisitor. It seems that only Carlos's friend Rodrigo can break free of these political and private constraints. But his bold dream of freedom leads to catastrophe. Giuseppe Verdi explores his great theme, the incompatibility of politics and private happiness, through almost all the characters in this opera, which premiered in 1867. For modern audiences, it paints an oppressively topical social panorama. In cooperation with the Salzburg Easter Festival, the Semperoper presents Don Carlo in the four-act Italian version of 1884, supplemented by a new instrumental prologue by composer Manfred Trojahn, which sets up the background to the drama.

10:00	Walking tour with nature park guide Michael Könemann from Stadt Wehlen to Kurort Rathen with a detour to the Teufelschlüchte, which are a wonderful example of the uniqueness and diversity of the national park. With a little crawling and a little head tucking between the rocks, hidden places with a fairytale appearance reveal themselves and leave room for dreaming. After the short detour, we continue through the impressive Zscherregrund and through the wildly romantic Höllengrund up to the Bastei plain and on to the viewing platform and the Bastei Bridge with its world-famous panorama. From the Bastei Bridge we descend towards Rathen, past the Neurathen rock castle and 2 further viewpoints - Kanapee and Tiedgeaussicht - which reveal yet more different perspectives of the Elbe Sandstone Mountains. Passing the steps of the Rathen rock stage, the route heads towards the Elbe to Kurort Rathen.

It was destroyed in the air raid on Dresden in February 1945. Its ruin remained, and in the GDR it was used as a memorial against war and destruction. After the political changes that led to the reunification of Germany, Dresden Frauenkirche Foundation began reconstruction work, supported by funding associations and donors from around the world. The reconstruction was based on the design specifications of George Bähr, who built the original church, using historical materials as far as possible. Built in 2005 by the organ builders Kern from Strasbourg, it unites the construction methods of the great organ builder brothers Gottfried and Andreas Silbermann in a special combination of tradition and modernity, enriched by the typical voices of a French-Romantic organ.

INFORMATION

The Friedrich-Schiller-Gymnasium is one of two grammar schools in the City of Pirna. The school has some 700 pupils and some 120 teachers. The school gained special significance on account of its German-Czech educational profile, which was contractually agreed on 20 May 1998. It is the only German-Czech grammar school in Germany. Since August 1998, 15 yearseven pupils have been welcomed to the school each year. who join a class with 15 German pupils. The pupils are taught some of their lessons in their respective mother tongue, some in the respective foreign language and some in classes with all the pupils. In year 12, all the pupils take the German Abitur (university entrance qualification). Complete recognition of this qualification by the Czech schools supervisory authority is certified. The Czech pupils are boarders at the school, where they are supervised by Czech teachers. The school's profile is reinforced by binational events. There is close cooperation with the Lessing and Diesterweg primary schools, enabling ongoing language learning to take place.

With more than 37,000 students and some 8,000 employees, Dresden's technical university, the Technische Universität Dresden (TUD), is the largest technical university in Germany and also one of Germany's eleven largest universities. The range of courses on offer exceeds that of comparable universities. With 126 courses of study, it has one of the broadest ranges of subjects at a German university, making it one of Germany's so-called "full universities". Since the third round of the Excellence Initiative, two Excellence Clusters and a graduate school at the TU Dresden have received funding. Thus, the university is one of the eleven universities referred to in the media as "elite" or "excellence universities".
