5 min	Plenary (Whole group)	The children understand that German is a world-wide language, not just European. The children are aware of Germany as a country and the German language and its geographical location in Europe The children can find Germany and Berlin (potentially other cities on the map)	Introduce the concept of learning German by finding out what the learners already know: Where do people speak German? Link to some facts about German language speakers Mainly Europe but also South America, especially Brazil, and parts of Africa, such as Namibia. There are lots of German accents and dialects, just like there are in English	World map and Europe map Interactive whiteboard/ screens to watch the videos. As the learners get more confident, shake the box a little to show that Felix and Franzi are waking up.	 Box made to look like a German post box (sticker available from the Goethe Institut that can be stuck onto a box painted yellow or covered with yellow paper. Needs to be big enough for the Felix and Franzi puppets. Felix and Franzi glove puppets. 	Wir singe jetzt ein Lied! – We are going to sing a song now. Here you could do a countdown before the video: Eins, Zwei, Drei- Stopp! - Three, two, one-Stop! Schüttel die Box! – Shake the box (said by the children to encourage the club leader to wake up Felix and Franzi. You could also develop a shared ritual to wake up the puppets, like a drum roll on the table with your fingers)

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			hands. Learners should reply with 'Hallo' or 'Guten Morgen/ Guten Tag' depending on the time of day. You could also reinforce vocabulary by matching gestures with words.		Hallo Felix! - Hello Felix! Hallo Franzi - Hello Franzi! Guten Morgen - Good morning. Guten Tag - Good day. Wie geht's? - How are you? (The children could answer "Gut" (I am fine). They could use a gesture to accompany "gut" like a raised thumb or shaping a heart with their hands).
5 min	Whole group	The children are familiar with the song and can join in with the words of the song. The children can engage in language rituals and routines	Learn the goodbye song in the same way and put Felix and Franzi back in the box.		Auf Wiedersehen, Felix, auf Wiedersehen Franzi- Goodbye Felix, goodbye Franzi (Incorporate a goodbye wave. You can also think of a ritual for putting the puppets back into the box like a shushing sound to signal) that Felix and Franzi are going back to sleep)
			Language note for Leaders: All nouns in German are spelled with a capital letter at all times. Auf Wiedersehen actually means until reseeing, where re-seeing is a noun. Pronunciation tips: W= an English 'v' sound
